Program Description

The bachelor of arts in Interdisciplinary Studies is designed to meet the individual needs of students and prepare them to be active contributors to a critically reflective, culturally diverse and democratic global society.

Social Science (27 credit hours)

An interdisciplinary study of the social sciences develops critical thinking, analytical reasoning, and research skills about human behavior, social dynamics, and the mechanisms of social change.

Complete 9 credit hours in at least three of: psychology, political science, international relations, anthropology and sociology, legal studies, or criminology and criminal justice (total 27 hours), selected in collaboration with your advisor. The capstone project must reflect a topic in the social sciences and an approach appropriate to the social sciences.

Social Welfare (27 credit hours)

This emphasis develops students' understanding of social systems, individual and community needs, and strategies for promoting social justice and equity

Complete 9 credit hours in at least three of: psychology, anthropology and sociology, criminology and criminal justice, legal studies, or educational studies (total 27 hours), selected in collaboration with your advisor. The capstone project must focus on social welfare.
